# 醫療傳教士維魏林的屬靈生命

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**摘要**: 維魏林(William Lockhart)是英國倫敦會派往中國的第一位醫療傳教 士,兩次前來中國,在中國服務近二十五年。創辦了上海仁濟醫院和北京協 和醫院,為西方醫學在中國傳播做出了不可磨滅的貢獻。目前,研究維魏林 的成果不多,主要散見於中國近代醫療史和近代來中國傳教士研究領域,主 要注重其在中國的醫療傳教工作成果。本文無意再複述和強調這一方面,願 在所獲得的一批新的資料——維魏林家族的往來通信的基礎上,從一位基督 徒、傳教士的屬靈生命的角度來探討其在中國服務期間的屬靈情況,或許可 以從一個全新的角度來看近代來中國的西方傳教士。

关键词: 維魏林、传教士、属灵生命

#### 一、引言

這篇小文章也許不能算是一份合格的歷史學論文,因為我不會用太多的 篇幅來描述這位來中國的醫療傳教士的歷史活動,也不會太關注其世俗活動, 比如建醫院、給病人看病、傳播福音。我所關注的是雒魏林作為一名基督徒, 一位傳教士的宗教情感和宗教生活。通過瞭解他在來中國前的宗教背景和宗 教生活,我們會發現他蒙召來中國傳福音的屬靈背景;通過觀察他在中國所 遇到的一些場合,比如遇到戰爭、事工受阻、親人離世等情景下表現出來的 宗教情感,我們能深切地體驗到他虔誠的屬靈生命。或許,他在中國所做的 世俗的事工,到現在已經被世人淡忘,如果你不特意向大眾介紹上海仁濟醫

院和北京協和醫院的教會醫院的歷史,前去看病的病人幾乎無人知道它們的 創辦人雒魏林。但是,通過閱讀雒魏林家族的書信,我們卻能切切感受到這 位傳教士在地上做鹽做光的屬靈生命。這種屬靈的生命是永生的,無法抹去 的。

所以,在寫這篇小文章的時候,我自己的屬靈生命也得到增長。這個果 效是顯而易見的。按照我所接受的史學訓練和以往研究的路數,我在看這批 信件的時候,可能會集中在雒魏林所做的那些世俗的事工,怎麼建造醫院, 看了多少病人,散發了多少聖經傳單等等。但是,這次再讀,吸引我的卻是 書信中大量的屬靈的內容,比如雒魏林與父親、姐姐討論聖經;在他遇到困 難的時候的禱告。對於一位傳教士來說,這種屬靈的生命才是一種最美好的 見證。

#### 二、資料的介紹

目前學界研究維魏林使用的資料主要是 CWM 的關於倫敦會的檔案中所 保存的維魏林與倫敦會的來往信件和報告。還有維魏林自己所撰的一本帶有 自傳性質的書《在中國的醫療傳教士: 20 年經驗的記錄》。這本書於 1861 年在倫敦出版。當時,他恰好第二次前往中國,因此在書的封面上標注的時 期為"從 1838 到 1858"。書中的大部分內容是講中國人的生活和風俗習慣, 以及在中國的醫療傳教的歷史。但是,它仍然不失為一份相當好的傳記資料。 除此之外,就是一些散見於同時代傳教士的著述當中的片言只語。

支撐起我這篇小文章的資料,除了上述檔案和書籍,最主要的還是維魏 林的玄孫 Alan P. Hughes,所謄寫編輯的維魏林家族的通信。1995年, Hughes 先生把維魏林的一些通信捐贈給了倫敦大學的亞非學院,並且根據 信件的內容撰寫了一部維魏林小傳。這些信件大部分是出自維魏林的手稿。 Hughes 先生按照時間順序編排,整理出這些手稿。這份通信集的信件的時 間段主要集中在 1833-1834 年其在都柏林和倫敦學習期間和 1841-1844 年其 初次來華期間。其中大約有 85 封是他寫的,其餘 39 封信是他父親和姐妹寫

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給他的。這些信件提供了大量的家族和當地的資訊, 記載了當時發生的事件, 而且還有相當長的篇幅討論了宗教情感和思想。所以, 這份維魏林的通信集 能展示出一個完整的維魏林的屬靈生命過程, 我相信能推進學界對維魏林的 研究。

#### 三、維魏林生平簡介

以往學術界對維魏林的生平介紹以來華之後的情況為詳,主要是參考了 偉列亞力(Alexander Wylie)所著《Memorials of Protestant missionaries to the Chinese》中關於維魏林(William Lockhart)的記述和維魏林所著帶有自 傳性質的書《在中國的醫療傳教士: 20 年經驗的記錄》。

反而對維魏林的家族歷史和早期的情況不甚了了。下麵,我就結合其玄孫 Hughes 先生所撰之《維魏林小傳》,把這段歷史情況稍作補充。

維魏林(William Lockhart)於1811年10月3日出生在利物浦。他的祖 父是湯姆斯·洛克哈特(Thomas Lockhart),早在1775年就來此定居了。洛 克哈特是一個蘇格蘭(Scottish)家族。據推測,其祖先可能傳自於1230年 把裝有羅伯特布魯斯心臟的骨灰盒送到聖地的騎士。關於湯姆斯祖上的情況, 我基本上不清楚,但是我知道他和一個來自倫敦德裏郡(London derry)的 姑娘相識並結婚了。這個姑娘的祖上在蘇格蘭是一個強烈反對國教的人,其 中一個還在1685年拒絕承認詹姆斯(James)為教會領袖的運動中被克拉夫 豪斯(Claverhouse)槍殺。他們本打算移民到美洲,但是卻在利物浦定居下 來。在利物浦,他們在戴爾大街(Dale Street)開了一家紙廠(Paper warehouse)。他的妻子,安妮·布萊克(Anne Black)是一個精力充沛、擁 有良好品質的女人。他們的事業非常興旺發達。1806年,他的丈夫去世之後, 安妮繼續經營著生意。但是他們主要的興趣還是在宗教上,他們是伯賽大教 堂(Bethesda chapel)熱心的支持者。

湯姆斯和安妮一共生育了6個孩子,其中3個在嬰兒時就夭折了。唯一

一個倖存的男孩是塞繆爾·布萊克·洛克哈特(Samuel Black Lockhart)。他出 生於 1781 年 11 月 17 日,後來成為當時英國第二大港的利物浦港的海關的 高級官員。1805 年,他和當地的一個姑娘伊莉莎白·拉塞爾(Elizabeth Lassell) 結婚。他們一共生育了 5 個孩子,但是只有兩個孩子存活了,就是威廉(注: 即維威廉)和 1807 年出生的姐姐伊莉莎白(Elizabeth)。一個哥哥湯姆斯

(Thomas) 在他 15 歲的時候去世了。他們的母親在 1816 年也去世了,當時他們還很小。他們是在父親和祖母安妮(Anne)的撫養下長大的。

他們是一個非常親密的家庭。他們的父親,看上去是一個相當嚴厲和虔 誠的人,對子女卻非常慷慨,充滿了愛心。他們之間的感情充滿溫暖和幽默, 其樂融融。他們是一個富裕的中產階級家庭,與利物浦的生意和行業上的朋 友保持著密切的聯繫。孩子們都受到了良好的教育。威廉接受了外科醫生的 訓練。在他的一封信中,他總是提到父親給他的機會,並表示深切的謝意。 的確,作為父親,他意識到他的兒子應該有足夠的金錢,不應該節制他的購 物欲望。而且,祖母也不時地給威廉 5 英鎊或者 10 英鎊的零花錢。用現在 的幣值來換算,相當於 50 倍的金錢,真是一大筆錢啊。在家中也有一個相 當好的文化環境,有一個相當規模的圖書館,還有家族遺傳下來的許多早期 繪畫大師的作品,包括卡納萊托(Canaletto)、普珊(Poussin)、特尼爾斯 (Tenniers)、範德梅爾(Vandermeer)、克勞德洛蘭(Claude Lorraine) 和呂斯達爾(Ruysdael)的作品。

關於威廉的學校生活,我知之甚少。好像是,他跟著哥哥、姐姐在彭布 羅克(Pembroke Place)的一所學校讀書。在那裏,他們一起學習法語和拉 丁文。當然,他接受了很好的教育,而且也是一個聰明的學生。我們不知道 究竟是什麼讓他決定成為一名醫生的,但是早在 1830 年 5 月份,他的姐姐 伊莉莎白就已經稱他為"醫生"了。那個時候專業的醫學機構還處於萌芽期。 當然,醫生的職業已經有很長的時間了,但是卻被劃分為幾個不同的類別。 內科醫師(Physician)是屬於精英分子,一般在牛津、劍橋和皇家學院裏面

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接受訓練。他們的數量很少,而且一般也只為富人服務。外科醫師 (Surgeon) 不過是一個小小的技師, 在一定程度上和理髮師同屬於一個行 會。後來,藥劑師(Apothecary)填補了兩者之間的空缺,他們有能力給大 部分人開處方治療,毫無疑問的是他們的失誤率要低於外科醫師。18 世紀以 來,外科醫師的技術大大提高,已經從理髮師的行列獨立出來,成立了專門 的外科醫師學院(the College of Surgeons)。他們的地位得到很大的改善。 大部分醫生都是先從藥劑師開始訓練, 需要 5 年的學徒期, 然後才能獲得外 科醫師的資格。這些醫生才開始作為全科醫生(General practitioners)被大 家所認可。威廉很清楚地決定要走這一條路。他跟隨當地的一個藥劑師帕克 先生(Mr. Parke)做學徒。1833 年 3 月,在他 22 歲的時候,他去了都柏林 (Dublin) 的米斯醫院(Meath Hospital)。在這裏,他在威廉·斯多克斯醫 生(Dr. William Stokes)的指導下學習。威廉·斯多克斯醫生是當時最傑出的 內科醫師之一,也是第一部聽診器使用條例的作者。他全身心地投入到學習 當中,甚至不去交朋友以免影響自己的學習。他參加解剖學的講座,在醫院 裏查房,他在斯多克斯醫生的指導下照顧 5 張床位,還參加解剖學的課程。 在他寫的一封信中,他說到,曾經從解剖室購買嬰兒的屍體拿回自己的房間 練習。他在都柏林呆了 5 個月, 按照現在的標準來看根本不算很長的時間。 7 月底,他回到利物浦的家中做短暫的停留。9 月底,他去了倫敦。10 月 3 日,他通過了考試,獲得了藥劑師的資格(LSA)。他繼續在蓋斯醫院 (Guy's Hospital) 學習, 第二年的 4 月 29 日他以優異的成績考入外科醫師 學院,還獲得了基先生外科醫生獎(Mr. Key's Surgical Prize)。他是一個嚴 肅的年輕人,大部分時間都用在學習上,或者去各種各樣的教會和教堂做侍 奉。他的社交生活嚴格限制在家族範圍內,儘量不去結交新的朋友,他認為 新朋友會讓自己分心。在倫敦的時候,他和好朋友愛德華·帕克在一起住過一 段時間。愛德華·帕克就是他以前做過學徒的帕克先生的兒子。他在學生時代 肯定放棄了不少正常的消遣活動。而且,儘管他從不提及,但是我們很清楚 地知道他是滴酒不沾的。他最喜歡的娛樂活動就是走很長的路去參觀訪問自

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己感興趣的地方,有時候一天走上 20 多英里也無所謂。這種生活方式他堅 持了好多年。

威廉的家庭是一個堅定的"非國教"徒(non-conformists)。就像我們看 見的那樣,他的祖母來自於一個因宗教信仰而受難的家庭,而且他的父親也 是一個有很深宗教情感的人,還是利物浦的貝塞大教堂和倫肖大街 (Renshaw Street)上的紐因頓教堂(Newington Chapel)的堅定支持者。 和他們通信的大多數都是神父和牧師,至少有一個家庭成員是"非國教"的牧 師。這是一個偉大的宗教復興時代。許多大的教會和教堂建立起來,接納了 越來越多的各個教派的信徒。數百人的集會非常普遍。<sup>1</sup>

後面關於維魏林來華之後的生平,就以偉列亞力(Alexander Wylie)所 著《Memorials of Protestant missionaries to the Chinese》中關於維魏林 (William Lockhart)的記述為主,附記於此,作為後文論述的一個線索。

維魏林被倫敦會(London Missionary Society)委派為去中國的醫療傳教 士後,於1838年7月31日同麥都思先生(Mr. Medhurst)及其家人搭乘喬 治四世號(The George the Fourth)輪船離開格雷夫森德(Gravesend),啟 程前往中國。在11月中旬到達巴達維亞(Batavia)。1839年1月底到達廣 東(Canton),參與醫療傳道會(Medical Missionary Society)的工作。在 一開始夏天的三個月時間裏,他獲委派來管理在澳門(Macau)的,伯駕醫 生(Dr. Parker)一手創辦的醫院。在廣東學習了近六個星期的中文之後,他 於2月28日前往澳門,但是由於當時的政治事件阻止他返回廣東。於是, 在7月1日,他開始在醫院的工作。但是,由於英國居民被迫離開這個葡萄 牙的殖民地,這項工作於8月21日中止。預計到中英之間的友好關係將會 中斷,他於9月7日離開中國前往巴達維亞,在那裏他在麥都思的指導下繼 續學習中文。1840年5月,他再次返回澳門,並於8月1日重新開辦醫院。 在此之前,合信醫生(Dr. Hobson)和 Diver 已經到達澳門,醫療傳道會名

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下的醫院已經交由他們來管理。

維魏林於 8 月底前往舟山群島(the island of Chusan)的定海(Tinghae)。當時定海已經處於英國軍隊的佔領之下。1840 年 9 月 13 日到 1841 年 2 月 22 日,他在定海為當地的老百姓開了一家醫院。由於英國政府撤出 了舟山,他也於 2 月 24 日離開舟山,第二個月回到澳門。在那裏,不久他 就和 Catherine Parkes 結婚。

1842 年,南京條約簽訂之後,他前往香港一直逗留到 1843 年春天。在 這期間,他主管醫療傳道會在這個殖民地的醫院大樓。6 月 13 日他到達舟山, 幾天後,他把妻子留在那裏,又和美魏茶(Rev.W.C.Milne)前往寧波 (Ningpo),一直呆到 7 月 7 日。美魏茶開始穿越內地前往廣東的旅行之後, 雒魏林返回舟山,又重新開辦了一家醫院。11 月 8 日,他前往上海 (Shanghae),20號就返回了舟山。後來,在12 月中旬,他又隨同從香港 北上路過舟山的麥都思一道離開舟山,途徑寧波,到達上海。1844 年 1 月中 旬,他臨時返回定海,關閉醫院,帶著夫人前往上海。2 月中旬又在上海開 辦了一家醫院。1846 年,他主要依靠當地的捐款建造了一棟新的、寬敞的醫 院樓,在其後定居在上海的時期裏,他一直在這裏繼續從事慈善醫療工作。

1848 年 3 月 8 日,他在距離上海 30 英里的青浦(Tsing-poo)遭到船民 的攻擊,僥倖逃出。1852 年,由於健康的原因,維魏林夫人攜帶孩子於 5 月 1 日返回英格蘭。1857 年初,維魏林也離開上海回國,於 1858 年 1 月 29 日 經過埃及和法國到達英格蘭。此時,他當選為倫敦的英國皇家外科學院院士 (F. R. C. S)。他在英國一直呆到 1861 年 6 月初,然後經過埃及又返回中國, 7 月 22 日到達香港,8 月 9 日到達上海,接著於 30 號乘坐飛龍(Fei-Loong) 號汽船前往天津(Teen-tsin),9 月份到達北京(Peking)。在北京,他建 立了一所醫院,開始傳教站的工作,一直逗留到 1864 年春天。然後南下上 海,4 月中匆忙訪問了漢口(Hankow)。返回上海之後,5 月份又開始了他 的日本之行,訪問了橫濱(Yokohama)和江戶(Yedo),於 6 月初返回上

海, 登上當月 6 日前往歐洲的第一班郵輪, 於 8 月 14 日到達英格蘭, 從此 一直積極參與支持中國的傳教活動。<sup>1</sup>

1867 年,他从伦敦会的海外宣教事务部门退休,但是仍然对传教活动保 持极大的熱情。他当选为伦敦会的理事,并且在 1869-70 年度担任主席。直 到去世,他始终是一个活跃的理事。1892 年,他把自己的收藏中国古籍和手 稿,以及著作的图书馆捐赠给了伦敦会。图书馆里收藏了大约 2600 多册书 籍和大量的包括 15 种语言的小册子。

1896 年 4 月 29 日威廉在生病两天后在布莱克海斯去世,下葬在伦敦的 阿博尼公墓(Abney Park cemetery)。葬礼在刘易舍姆教会舉行。<sup>2</sup>

#### 四、屬靈生命:虔誠、順服、謙卑、事奉

這批雜魏林家族的信件,如果按照時間階段來劃分的話,基本上可以劃 分為兩個大的階段,即早年的學習生活和差派到中國傳教兩個階段。其中, 後者又可以劃分為三個小的階段,即初入中國,在廣東、澳門、香港和浙江 沿海(包括寧波和舟山)活動階段;上海傳教和成立仁濟醫院階段;北上京 津階段。

(1) 早年學習生活的屬靈生命

從上文生平記錄來看, 維魏林出生一個虔誠的基督徒家庭。早年維魏林 離家, 在都柏林和倫敦醫學院學習階段。從信件的日期和他與家人(主要是 父親和姐姐)在信件中的約定看, 基本上保持著有規律的通信, 按照當時郵 路快慢, 一般每月通信兩次。在這些信件中, 除了介紹自己的學習和生活情 況, 有大量的篇幅記述他的宗教生活和信仰討論。每週都有參加主日崇拜, 有時還去主日學和教會學校。他父親和姐姐在信中也非常關心他的宗教生活, 多次督促他去主日學和閱讀有關屬靈的書籍, 並與他討論, 有的信件中甚至

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超過三分之二的篇幅都在討論信仰問題。

比如,1810 年 12 月 1 日維魏林寫給父親的一封信中,就充滿熱情地討論"什麼是宗教之美"。

Dear sir, If you expect a minute account of any particular circumstance that first led me to see a beauty in Religion I fear I shall not be able to inform you to your satisfaction. Some time past I was convinced (by conversing with a young lady who is eminently pious) that "the ways of Religion were pleasant and all her paths peace". Often hearing my friend speak of her unworthiness, I was rather surprised and it led me to think if she was I certainly must be so upon examining I found that of myself I could do nothing towards the saving og my soul and I trust was enable to put entire confidence in him bore my Sins "in his oen body on the tree and who is able to save to the uttermost all that come into God by him" The advice Miss N used to give me was "Cleave to God with full purpose of heart persevering grace will carry you on then happiness is sure Heaven is sure and all the way to it paved with pleasure." She persuade me to read the Scriptures seriously and attentively as first I thought it an arduous task to read a Chapter a day but before I have read very far I began to see a beauty in the Bible which I had never observed in

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any other book and I trust God has explained his own word to me if God has indeed begun a good work in my heart and enable me to lay hold on the hope of eternal life. I convinced it must be from free and sovereign grace and not on account of any thing that there is in me to recommend me to his mercy for I am a poor guilty sinful and unworthy creature -- being desirous to be a sincere follower of the Lamb whithersoever he goth I think it my duty as well as my priviledge to partake of the ordinance of the Lord's Supper Should you and the rest of the Church as Bethesda admit me in communion with you? I beg to have an interest in your prayer that I may bring no reproach on the name of Christ but may spring and grow up like a plant in the home of our God.<sup>1</sup>

I wish to employ part of my paper in writing about religion. What hinders me more than any thing else from speaking to you, is , that you often see

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many inconsistencies in my conduct, which although they are bitterly repented if in private, are not surely sufficiently striven against or they would not be so often repented, but I assure you it is so easy matter to get the better of tempers and feelings which by long habit are become part of our nature. And those Scriptures which represent the Christian life as a race, a warfare and a toilsome journey are strictly true in the experience of those who any thing of their own deceitful hearts. But don't. my dear brother let any prospect of the difficulties of the way prevent you from setting out on pilgrimage to the heavenly city. There is a joy and peace in believing in Christ and serving him which altogether overbalances every difficulty. And it is only our own carelessness and indifference that ever make us unhappy in religion. Sometimes I have thought you had begun to seek God, and indeed I cannot help hoping now that it is so, but my dear brother do make a thorough work of it, and never rest till you know in whom you believe.

God has told us to give him no rest till he make Jerusalem a praise in the earth and surely we may pray and entreat and give him no rest till our own soul is saved. Oh William be decided, you have any things that occupy your attention, don't nigle at the most important of all. Begin at the beginning of religion, at the foot of the cross, at the feet of Saviour, don't let him go till he bless you, which he will do most assuredly, for none were ever cast out that came to him.

I would be very glad to write to you occasionally even when you are at home if you would like it, and would sometime write to me;... Let us talk together of these things: it would help us both, and God has a book of remembrance written before for them who fear him and think on his name in connection with the mention of this book it is said they that feared the Lord

spoke often one to another. I would say much more but have no more room . One thing I must say pray earnestly, read the Scriptures with an earnest desire that the Spirit any enlighten your heart to understand them and you will not pray and read in vain.

My dear son,

.....

In serving the God, -- as the vows of God are upon you, let it be your chief care to perform them; for you know "it were better you shd not vow, than that you shd vow and not pay" Eccles 5.5 -- the frequent surrender of ourselves to God, when it is deliberately and cordially done, is a blessed means to invigorate and increase the holiness of our life, -- how happy are they that have God for their father, how gracious will he be to them that are his adopted sons and daughters, their Father is an everlasting covenant Psl 144.15 -- God's children have his choicest affections; he has a love of benevolence to all his creatures, but the hath a love of complacem.. to them. It is an everlasting love Jer. 31.3 it is an unspeakable and inexpressible love --God's children are under his constant protection in the time of trouble. He will hide them in his pavillions in the secret of this tabernacle will he hide them, he will set them upon a Rock: upon such a rock where neither Men nor devils can come to ruin them Psal 27.5 In a word his mercy and his goodness shall compass them round about God's children are the objects of his special blessings they are "the seed which the Lord has blessed" Isa 61.9 whatever they have whether it be little or much, prosperity or adversity, yet they have a

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blessing with it; the Lord will bless his people with peace. The lord bless thee my dear son, and keep thee, the Lord make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee, the Lord lift up his countenance upon thee and give thee peace, (Numb 10.24) "the Lord watch between me and thee, when we are absent one from another" Gen 31.49 --

My dear william, in dependance upon the help of God, let your religious principles be accompanied with steady resolutions. Temptations and difficulties unknown before attend every new scene of life, which soon overcome the unprepared and irresolute mind, but if you discern the hook as well as the bait, and consider the consequences as well as the incentives to evil, by the Grace of the God Jesus Christ you may escape -- pious meditation is a branch of true religion, much of the temper of our thoughts, sometimes we may turn our meditations into ejaculatory prayers and addresses to heaven such as that of the Messiah "Remember me, oh my God for good". Nehem 13-31 and "Lord I am thine save me" Psal 119 and the like; these when you feel the guilt of sin to press you or the sense of mercy to afflict you, or any dificulty or danger to affright you, you will be a present ... To your spirit, these sethods ..... Men have often taken to good purpose.

I am not able at this distance, to render you the personal services as your only son that I ought to do, but you have given me to the Lord and He who is one Heavenly Father will bless and comfort you and be your staff and stay continually and that the blessing of the Highest may ever rest upon you and grant you much peace and joy in serving him and that we(?) may your comfort and consolation is my dear Father, the constant and fervent of your far distant, though much affectionate son and daughter.

By it, I was anxious to have one because I perceive there was a battle at Macao between the British and the Chinese, the events now taking place in China are look'd upon with great interest, the finger of God's providence is at this moment pointing many eyes to China, -- Its present condition is one of

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deep interest, both from the occurrent cirsumstances themselves, and from the mighty consequences which they involve. There is much in the present movement to attract the gaze of the world and there is more to draw the attention of the Christian and to call forth his prayer. It has been forbidden ground. -- it is not easy to foresee what may be the effects of the present hostilities upon missions to China. In all likelihood they will throw the country more open and render our missionary settlement more secure. The cry of the millions of China is "come over and help us". And God seems now to be seconding this cry by opening a door and preparing a way for the entrance of the gospel into these, the most impenetrable of Satan's fastnesses. -- if British merchants are suspense for the issue of the present contest and eagerly expecting new avenues of commerce shall British Christians be less awake, less anxious, less prepared? The warrior, the merchant, the diplomatists, are nothing, save as the breakers up of a way for the entrance of the Bible and the missionary. When they have served this purpose they are laid by as useless, but the missionary with the Bible in his hand is to be God's special agent to work His gracious designs for long neglect China.

I suppose it is now more that a month since you heard of the death of dear Lizzie, I feel that all is well regarding that dear child and that the Lord hath done that which is best for her and for us, but it is sad indeed to have no child on earth, true we have her in heaven and shall see her again, but her laughing face and merry smile are ...ting in our family circle and sadly do we feel her removal, yet grace hath been given us to hear our affliction and we have been enable to resign our child in to the Lord's hands, may the trail be blessed to our souls and we be made meet for the inheritance of the saints in heaven. Mrs Brown's 2<sup>nd</sup> child an infant son was very ill according to last letters and we fear that she will not live, almost all our families have been much tried during the last few months, may these things be blessed to us all.

June 17<sup>th</sup> yesterday the Jany and Feby letters arrived they affected us very much in the account they give us of your feelings regarding the death of our beloved Lizzie, we know how deeply you would grieve for her death but that sweet voice that used in play to try to imitate us at family worship in singing is now singing His praise in Heaven and her little hand has indeed grasped the Palm of victory -- and while we still sorrow over our loss, yet praise be His name for he does all things well.

#### 五、結论

尽管有人會說,他首先是一个医生,然後才是一位传教士。他的传教活动与 其说是一种宗教行为,不如说基本上是一种人道主义。他的生活目标第一位的, 重中之重的是要给那些成千上万的前来找他的人提供服务,帮助他们解除身體上 的痛苦,而且这些服务是免费的,不求回报的,也不分种族贵贱的,不管他们是 欧洲人还是中国人,穷人还是富人,基督徒还是非基督徒,对所有的人都一视同 仁。他竭尽所能的满足他们身体治疗的需要,也愿意试图劝说他们接受他所提供 的宗教信仰上的治疗。这些同样给予他勇气和精力支持他从事医疗工作。

但是,通過以上我們簡單地梳理,不難發現,他的信仰给了他一种动力用一 生去承担做一个传教士的责任。说到他有高度的屬靈生命,这是毫无疑问的。出 生在一个虔誠的基督教家庭,以圣经为中心的环境中长大,他也會自觉地用自己 的方式来实践基督教的精神。在他 18 岁的时候,基督教精神成为塑造他的生活 和性格的中心支柱。他是一个虔誠的人,而且完全相信:通过耶稣基督 (Jesus Christ),每个人都可以找到自己的救赎之路。每一个成功和每一个不幸都来自 上帝的安排,如果我们能聽上帝的話語,遵循上帝的道,就会离上帝越来越近,

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與上帝的關係越來越密切。而且在最后,他还相信在上帝的面前,会和所有亲人 团聚。

倫敦會醫療傳教士維魏林屬靈生命給我們的啟示是,作為一位傳教士,他不 僅有"屬世"的世俗生活和事工(雖然也是為彰顯和榮耀上帝而做);還有"屬靈" 的一面,就是基督徒和傳教士與上帝的關係。屬靈的關係對基督徒看來這個世界 和在世俗社會中所作的事工有直接的影響,也是基督徒與非基督徒的一個"特殊" 的區別。所以,在我們對近代來中國傳教士的研究中,不僅要關注他們在中國社 會做了哪些事工,建立了多少學校、醫院、培養了多少學生、救治了多少病人, 對中國近代社會的發展做出了多大貢獻;更為重要的,還要研究他們在中國大地 上的屬靈信仰和見證。正是這種信仰才是他們在中國大地上撒種奉獻的中心支柱, 這種美好的見證也是一種寶貴的精神財富。
